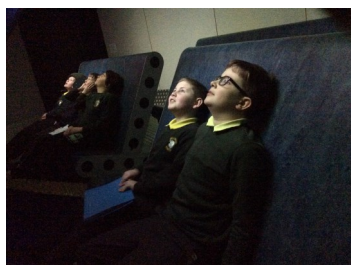
Thank you to everyone who entered our 'reading in unusual places' competition. We had a fantastic amount of entries, showcasing a range of reading styles.

Internet Safety Tip

What is the next big thing? Potentially, it is a game called Palworld. Palworld is an open world survival game from Pocketpair in Japan that is similar to Nintendo's Pokémon franchise. Unlike Pokémon, players can use Pals to do more than fight.

Is Palworld safe for kids? Palworld's cute creatures and similarities to Pokémon can make the game seem child-friendly. However, it does contain violence, weapons and interactions with strangers. The PEGI 12 rating suggests that children 12 and over can play it, but this will vary from child to child. It's a good idea to play with your child and gauge whether it is appropriate yourself.

Tips to help children play safely. Help children stay safe as they game. Here are some tips to keep kids safe while playing Palworld.

- **Game together:** As Palworld remains in early access, you might want to set Palworld as a game to play together. This will let you both explore the world so you can quickly spot any potentially harmful content.
- **Set parental controls:** Whether you're on PC or using Xbox, you can set parental controls through Microsoft Family. Microsoft parental controls can help you manage screen time and stranger contact.
- **Stay up-to-date:** Follow Palworld on social media or set alerts on news sites to get future updates about Palworld. You will then be the first to know of any changes or potential issues
